ORDINANCE NO. 2025-995

An ordinance of the City of Gainesville, Florida, amending the Zoning Map Atlas by rezoning approximately 1.38 acres of property generally located at the 1200 block of NE 8th Ave, as more specifically described in this ordinance, from Urban 4 (U4) to Urban 6 (U6); providing directions to the City Manager; providing a severability clause; providing a repealing clause; and providing an effective date.

 - e. Section 633.202, Florida Statutes, relating to the Florida Fire Prevention Code.

The proposed ordinance applies to specific private property generally located at the 1200 block of NE 8th Ave. This ordinance would change the zoning of the subject property from Urban 4 (U4) to Urban 6 (U6).

City of Gainesville staff held a public hearing at the City Plan Board on December 18th, 2025. The public hearing was noticed in the local newspaper per Florida Statute requirements, and mailed notice was sent in accordance with the noticing requirements of Section 30-3.8 of the Land Development Code. As part of this application, the private applicant was required to hold a neighborhood workshop to solicit feedback per Section 30-3.7 of the Land Development Code.
