


Incidents and Unit Responses





Annual Program Appraisals

The GFR Team worked diligently throughout 2023 to successfully achieve CFAI Reaccreditation in February 2024. Command Staff annually appraise each program for performance, training, resources, accomplishments, and sustainability. Their detailed reports are available upon request.

- **5A.7 Community Risk Reduction:** GFR's Fire Marshal and four Fire Safety Inspectors help our neighbors remain safe and our economy resilient by ensuring property owners identify and correct conditions that increase risks of injury and property damage due to fires and overcrowding. During 2023, the Risk Reduction Team conducted 3,407 building inspections, reviewed 231 special event permits, conducted 37 special event inspections, and reviewed 254 site plans. Inspectors also follow up on false fire alarm activations. Their efforts saw a reduction from 1,800 false alarms in 2022 to 1,050 in 2023.
- **5B.4. Public Education:** Due to budget impacts, the full-time Fire and Life Safety Educator position was deleted from the FY24 GFR roster. Services have been coordinated by the Fire Marshal, the CRP Program Coordinator, a part-time temporary FLSE, and limited-duty personnel. Their combined efforts served to educate nearly 5,000 neighbors through 144 total events. GFR will seek grant funding opportunities to keep this program active during 2024.
- **5C.4 Investigative Services:** GFR's Investigative Services conducted 104 fire investigations and determined that 13 were caused by arson. The Investigations resulted in three arrests. One youth was referred to the Juvenile Firesetter Intervention Program. An investigator may spend significant time at a fire scene and health and safety continues to be a priority. The agency strives to reduce health risks by providing multiple forms of respiratory protection in addition to air monitoring equipment.
- **5D.9 Domestic Preparedness:** The Emergency Manager role for the City is filled by one of GFR's District Chiefs who also manages accreditation, grants, and special event staffing. During 2023, GFR's Emergency Manager was elected as Chair of the Local Mitigation Strategy group. Two program enhancements included the development with the GFR Community Health Program of FACE-It, a gathering of faith-based and neighborhood organizations that assist with outreach for storm planning and health education, and the implementation of the Sentinel Group comprised of North Central Florida Public Safety agencies designed to bolster community resilience through collaboration.
- **5E.3 Fire Suppression:** Gainesville property owners may benefit on insurance rates from the Insurance Services Office Public Protection Classification rating for Gainesville of 2/2x. The rating is based on GFR's stations, apparatus, staffing, inspections, investigations, public education, and training, and on the GRU water supply system and communications system. GFR seeks to close financial gaps with grant applications that support the purchase of equipment essential to safe fire suppression operations, such as personal protective equipment. The continued vertical building growth in the community requires GFR to be prepared for high-rise firefighting while the expansion of electric vehicles and battery-powered devices presents additional challenges for firefighters. In 2023, Fire Suppression personnel protected 97% of property at risk during fire events representing an approximate value of \$85 million in property saved.
- **5F.9 Emergency Medical Services:** GFR units responded to over 17,400 EMS incidents during 2023. Every Engine, Aerial, and Squad has at least one Paramedic on-board 24/7 to provide advanced life support services. The GFR EMS program ensures personnel are trained and maintain their certifications. The EMS Captain conducts quality assurance reviews on significant incidents as part of GFR's continuous improvement process. A significant measure of success is the Return of Spontaneous Circulation (ROSC) for cardiac arrest patients. Bystander CPR is the first step toward successfully saving a life and, in 2023, GFR achieved a ROSC rate of 54% when Bystanders started CPR before EMS arrival. Additional EMS services include the SWAT Medic team which responded to 59 incidents and 10 special events.
- **5G.2 Technical Rescue:** Light Technical Rescue Team (LTRT) #310 is a member of Florida Task Force 8. Nearly 30 team members are trained to respond to rescues from confined spaces, elevated sites, structural collapses, vehicle and machinery entrapments, and swift water rescues. The team's valuable skills were called upon again during a TF8 deployment in August after Hurricane Idalia devasted parts of the Florida Gulf Coast.



Annual Program Appraisals

5H.3 Hazardous Materials: The GFR Hazardous Materials Team (GFRHMT) is a Type I regional asset prepared to respond 24/7 to mitigate disasters. Nearly 50 personnel have successfully trained to meet this need and, in 2023, the HMT responded to an explosion with multiple injuries at a facility in High Springs where they successfully made entry and shut down an ongoing chemical release.

51.2 Aircraft Rescue and Firefighting: The ARFF team responded to six aircraft alerts, seven automatic alarms, and 23 emergency medical incidents in 2023. In addition to maintaining the department's SCBA supply, the ARFF crew completed required FAA training and drills to ensure they are prepared for any emergency. The team also successfully recertified 17 personnel.

5L.2 Community Resource Paramedicine (CRP): CRP Responders I and II regularly improve the quality of life for Gainesville neighbors. Following four pillars of service: Chronic Disease Management; Homelessness Outreach and Prevention; Recovery Response; and Community Health, the team connected directly with nearly 600 patients and provided additional outreach at over 70 community events during 2023. CRP accomplished their mission through agency partnerships and with the support of over 50 student interns. Success is measured by individualized impacts such as reducing the need to call 911 or go to the hospital because of improved healthcare and medication management. CRP members represent GFR and the City of Gainesville as industry leaders at national conferences such as EMS World. Technological advances also support success and CRP now utilizes Telehealth; HealthCall, an Electronic Health Record System, and Mobile Integrated Health to deliver and manage care. During 2023, GFR Chief Dixon and Community Health Director Brandy Stone took on lead roles for City of Gainesville initiatives to address Gun Violence and needs for unhoused neighbors. Other accomplishments included hiring four new Responders; launching the Community Health pillar of the program; completing the "Gainesville Overdose Prevention Plan Project" through the Combatting Overdose Through Community Level Intervention (COCLI) Grant; and being awarded sponsorship by the Children's Trust of Alachua County for health and safety programming for youth.

8B.6 Training: The Training Bureau Team managed an extensive program of classes, certifications, drills, and hiring and promotional processes during 2023 while continuing to work out of a partially collapsed building and a modular classroom. Their "can-do" spirit has overcome obstacles to ensure professional requirements and certifications are maintained and that Operations personnel are trained and ready to advance their knowledge, skills, and abilities as future GFR leaders. The Team will be moving to the Catalyst building in 2024 which should better support meeting goals and objectives.

9B.13 Communications: The City previously contracted with GRU for access to the countywide 800 Mhz Trunked Radio System (TRS). GRU sold the TRS to Alachua County in 2023. Dispatching services are contracted with the Alachua County Sheriff's Office Combined Communications Center (CCC). The CCC uses both Emergency Medical Dispatch (EMD) and Emergency Fire Dispatch (EFD) protocols to process incoming calls for service. GFR will be working with the County to address a technology gap identified in 2023 during a scheduled update. Until that is addressed, cell phones have been placed on all GFR units to be used in the event of a system-wide TRS outage.

11B.6 Health and Safety / Physical Fitness: In spite of financial challenges, GFR prioritizes cancer prevention, mental health, and wellness and fitness. Accomplishments in 2023 included completion of annual station inspections; PPE inspections; annual physicals; annual 5K run, and physical fitness evaluations. A long-term and significant goal continues to be the acquisition of a second set of personal protective gear for each sworn position to reduce cancer risks from exposure.

Facilities: GFR is seeking over \$80 million to build six new stations as outlined by the 2021 Growth and Expansion Feasibility Master Plan. Funding will be supported by the sales tax revenue approved by voters for Streets, Stations, and Strong Foundations. Staff assigned to GFR Administration, Risk Reduction, Training, and Community Health have been preparing to move to the Catalyst Building at 606 SE Depot Avenue in 2024. This will be the first time ever that all GFR administrative and support teams will be in the same location.

Fleet: 2023 has been a busy year for fleet planning. GFR took delivery of two new engines to replace E2 and E5 in 2023 and prepared orders for two District Chief vehicles for 2024. A 100-foot aerial is also in development to replace Quint 8 in summer 2024 and a Hazardous Materials/Heavy Squad is being planned to replace the 2006 unit currently at Station 2. Funding, cost of parts, and extended times for delivery of parts and apparatus continue to challenge GFR and Fleet staff to creatively fill service gaps.
