



*On December 6, 2016 the Emergency Fire Dispatch protocol was implemented which changed the classification of some incident types. Vehicle accidents, previously coded as EMS incidents are now classified in the Fire group.

Annual Program Appraisals

The GFR Command Staff annually appraise each program for effectiveness and future needs. Detailed reports look at performance, training, resources, accomplishments, and sustainability needs. Here are *highlights* from those reports.

5A.7 Fire Suppression - Assistant Chief Michael Cowart

Fire Suppression is only one of many response demands that GFR Emergency Operations responds to. In 2017, there were 308 calls dispatched as building fires; of those, 37 were confirmed structure fires. GFR prevented further loss to over 80% of the value of these properties. Fire apparatus continue to navigate roadways that are impacted by congestion and traffic calming. In the built-out areas of the city, the rtotal esponse time for the first arriving GFR unit from the time the call is started in the system was better than 8:42 90% of the time. An important addition in 2017 was the opening of a modular fire station at 4213 SW 30th Avenue in October which housed Squad 9. Operations also staffed up for responses during Hurricane Irma in September 2017 and extinguished one house fire while the storm passed through town.

5B.8 Fire Prevention - Assistant Chief Stephen Hesson

The Risk Reduction Bureau's (RRB) Fire Inspection Program operated with three full-time Fire Safety Inspectors and one Operations member on full-time reassignment as an Inspector. Together they completed 100% of the statutorily mandated annual inspections and 100% of owner-requested inspections. This included 3533 buildings totaling 23,979,468 square feet. One inspector also conducts pre-construction plans reviews to ensure compliance with fire safety and fire apparatus access needs are addressed. Nearly 10% of this inspector's scheduled time was applied toward completing 206 plans reviews. The RRB continues to seek funding through the annual budget process for additional inspectors.

5C.7 Public Education - Fire and Life Safety Educator Krista Ott

GFR is dedicated to preventing injury, loss of life, and property damage through many efforts. The Public Education program focuses GFR's limited resources on our youngest populations. During 2017, over 27,000 citizens were reached through station tours, firefighter visits, Safety City programs, Crowd Manager training, car seat installations, youth firesetter intervention, smoke alarm installations, and a variety of other activities. This was an increase of 35% over 2015 and 2016 and represents the successful teamwork between the Risk Reduction and Operations Bureaus' teams. This program continues to have only one full-time employee and GFR continues to seek funding for a Community Relations Officer that would augment this program as well as recruitment and other citizen-centered needs.

5BD.8 Investigative Services - Fire Cause and Origin - Investigative Services Officer Kelly DeRasmo

GFR has one full-time investigator who is a state-certified law enforcement officer. During 2017, program enhancements focused on updating procedures, software, and safety equipment. The ISO conducted 68 cause and origin investigations and determined that 44 were unintentional, seven were confirmed as arson, one was referred to the juvenile firesetter program, and 16 were undetermined. The RRB continues to work with its Fire Safety Inspector team to identify and train personnel to serve as backup fire investigators.

5E.7 Technical Rescue - District Chief Don Campbell, Jr.

GFR continues to provide training and support for our 25-member Type II Light Technical Rescue Team (LTRT) #310, which serves locally and as part of a regional Urban Search and Rescue team known as Task Force 8 (TF8). In 2017, TF8 deployed two teams to Key West and the Jacksonville area for search and rescue after Hurricane Irma. Continuing education was completed monthly to maintain skills for Rope Rescue, Confined Space Rescue, Trench Rescue, Vehicle and Machinery Rescue, and Structural Collapse Rescue. During 2017, members of the LTRT responded to 7 machinery extrications; 7 confined space incidents; and one building collapse incident. As part of daily operations, there were also 55 responses to stalled elevators. Goals include training and equipment for swift water rescue; upgrades for personal protective equipment, a dedicated "Heavy Rescue" apparatus, and additional trained members.



Annual Program Appraisals

5F.7 Hazardous Materials - Hazmat Specialist John Dowling

The GFR Hazardous Materials Team (HMT) is a Type I team consisting of 43 technicians and responds locally and as part of a North Central Florida multi-county LEPC Regional Hazardous Material Response Team. Although GFR has an apparatus dedicated to hazmat the agency accomplishes staffing this unit with personnel assigned to Tower 2 who must also respond to fire, medical, and other types of incidents. The unit was dispatched to 221 incidents in 2017 and handled routine requests such as fuel or chemical odors and small leaks to more complex incidents such as suspicious packages, and a train derailment. A 2017 SWOT analysis identified future needs to plan for replacement of the hazmat apparatus and to identify funding for replacement of the hazmat air bottles.

5G.10 Emergency Medical Services - District Chief Shawn Hillhouse

GFR Operations provides a minimum of one firefighter certified as a paramedic to provide advanced life support (ALS) on each apparatus. Up to 65% of GFR's unit responses are to meet the demand for medical services. One of the key measures in our EMS program is the Return of Spontaneous Circulation (ROSC) rate for cardiac arrest incidents. The results for 2017 reinforced the conclusion that Bystander CPR makes a difference. When Bystanders started CPR before EMS units could arrive the ROSC rate improved from 40% to 55%. A SWOT analysis of the 2017 program indicates the need for more than one training member to complete EMS quality assurance reviews. These reviews identify opportunities to enhance services through meeting specific training needs and by identifying trends in problems faced by the community that may require new or updated protocols or other services. The Community Resource Paramedicine Program (CRP) began to gain traction in 2017 and goals for 2018 included the addition of a CRP Coordinator to maintain program continuity and assure access to community health resources. The EMS program also provides support for the agency's SWAT medics who respond with local law enforcement agencies. The SWOT analysis identified the need for an appropriately equipped and armored vehicle to support SWAT medics and patients at high-risk incidents.

51.6 Aircraft Rescue and Firefighting - District Chief Rusty Barrett

GFR continues to staff two firefighters to operate the ARFF apparatus for Gainesville Regional Airport (GRA). In 2017, the GRA completed construction of a replacement fire station which moved the units closer to the Airport Terminal and Tower. The combined station design team was recognized for their excellent work at the GFR Annual Awards Ceremony in April 2018. The ARFF team consists of 9 certified Lieutenants and 11 certified Driver Operators. They responded to 20 reports of aircraft trouble, six fire alarms, and 15 medical calls; three of their incidents were for aircraft that had verified problems - all landed safely.

7G.7 Health and Safety / Physical Fitness - District Chief Don Campbell, Jr.

Maintaining the health and well-being of GFR's first responders is accomplished through several annual activities that are overseen by the Health and Safety and Physical Fitness Committees. Station and gear inspections, annual and five-year physicals, and fitness events combined with access to Employee Health Services, a first-responder mental health care provider, and Peer Fitness Trainers comprised a comprehensive program in 2017. The Committees reviewed accident analysis forms and completed a SWOT analysis which identified needs for more early cancer screening tools and cardiovascular abnormality identification. Improvement initiatives are aimed at early detection as well as reducing exposure by finding funding for a department-wide second set of personal protective equipment (aka bunker gear). This would prevent firefighters having to put on gear just used in a fire before getting an opportunity to clean it.

9B.10 Communications - District Chiefs Allen Siorek and Adam Hinton

GFR continues to receive dispatching services from the Alachua County Sheriff's Office Combined Communications Center (CCC). The District Chief overseeing this program works closely with the CCC managers and staff to constantly monitor performance and make technology and policy adjustments when indicated. During 2017, the CCC transitioned to an established fire dispatch protocol very similar to the one used for processing medical calls. The EFD system provides for a high degree of call diversification in an effort to ensure the appropriate units are dispatched. Call processing times are monitored by both agencies. In 2017, the call processing times improved for medical calls and a slight increase in times for fire calls reflects the transition to the new system. The trunked radio system has been nearing its end-of-life cycle and plans are in development to replace the system. A SWOT analysis recommends GFR consider a future position to serve as a full-time program manager.
